### **Prompt Reflection**

I interpreted the prompt as asking me to analyze the rhetorical situation of Johannes Haushofer's *CV of Failures*, and its components. Then, using this newfound understanding of his style, tone, purpose, audience, and genre compose my own *CV of Failures*.

### **Revisions**

The revisions I made were expanding the definition of labels so that readers may understand what these failures are. I also organized the failures by recency. A pattern I hadn't recognized in Haushofer's CV. I used the same categories as Haushofer, which organized the CV very well for readers.

### **Purpose**

My purpose was to meet the criteria of the prompt and to write a list of my most regrettable failures that I could use to remind myself of.
